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## SCHEME DETAILS

### SHIRE OF ASHBURTON LOCAL PLANNING SCHEME NO. 8

The Shire of Ashburton under the powers conferred by the *Planning and Development Act 2005* makes the following Local Planning Scheme.



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## Part 1 - Preliminary

### 1. Citation

This local planning scheme is the *Shire of Ashburton Scheme No 8*.

### 2. Commencement

Under section 87(4) of the Act, this local planning scheme comes into operation on the day on which it is published in the *Gazette*.

### 3. Scheme revoked

The following local planning scheme(s) is (are) revoked -

*Shire of Ashburton Local Planning Scheme No. 7* gazetted on 24 December 2004 as amended.

### 4. Notes do not form part of Scheme

Notes, and instructions printed in italics, do not form part of this Scheme.

*Note: The Interpretation Act 1984 section 32 makes provision in relation to whether headings form part of the written law.*

### 5. Responsibility for Scheme

The *Shire of Ashburton* is the local government responsible for the enforcement and implementation of this Scheme and the execution of any works required to be executed under this Scheme.

### 6. Scheme area

This Scheme applies to the area shown on the Scheme Map except the area known as *Improvement Scheme No. 1: Ashburton North Strategic Industrial Area (Gazetted 30 September 2016)*, which is excluded from the Scheme. All offshore islands within the Scheme area are included in the Scheme.

### 7. Contents of Scheme

(1) In addition to the provisions set out in this document (the *scheme text*), this Scheme includes the following –

- (a) the deemed provisions (set out in the *Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015 Schedule 2*) including any supplemental deemed provisions outlined in Schedule A of the *scheme text*;
- (b) the Scheme Map;
- (c) the following plans, maps, diagrams, illustrations or materials –

There are no plans, maps, diagrams, or illustrations or materials in addition to the provisions set out in this document.

- (2) This Scheme is to be read in conjunction with any local planning strategy for the Scheme area.

#### 8. Purposes of Scheme

The purposes of this Scheme are to –

- (a) set out the local government's planning aims and intentions for the Scheme area; and
- (b) set aside land as local reserves for public purposes; and
- (c) zone land within the Scheme area for the purposes defined in this Scheme; and
- (d) control and guide development including processes for the preparation of structure plans and local development plans; and
- (e) set out procedures for the assessment and determination of development applications; and
- (f) set out procedures for contributions to be made for the costs of providing infrastructure in connection with development through development contribution plans; and
- (g) make provision for the administration and enforcement of this Scheme; and
- (h) address other matters referred to in Schedule 7 of the Act.

#### 9. Aims of Scheme

The aims of this Scheme are –

- (a) Enhance the landscape and environment by protecting ecological values and promoting sustainable natural resource management;
- (b) Preserve heritage values and areas of cultural significance;
- (c) Promote a diversity of housing types and lot sizes that accommodate all sectors of the population while preserving and enhancing local character;
- (d) Promote local economic development and employment diversification, whilst acknowledging and maintaining traditional mining and pastoral activities;
- (e) Protect rural land for sustainable agricultural production and minimise land use conflict;
- (f) Acknowledge and mitigate the health risks within the Wittenoom townsite;
- (g) Promote community well-being by fostering connectivity, safety, and security;
- (h) Create well-defined, distinctive town sites that cultivate a strong sense of local identity;
- (i) Encourage regional development and strengthen interregional connections; and
- (j) Outline and protect the region's transport and infrastructure networks, considering the potential impacts on existing operations and future regional

*transport capacity.*

**10. Relationship with local laws**

Where a provision of this Scheme is inconsistent with a local law, the provision of this Scheme prevails to the extent of the inconsistency.

**11. Relationship with other local planning schemes**

There are no other local planning schemes of the Shire of Ashburton which apply to the Scheme area.

**12. Relationship with region planning scheme**

There are no regional planning schemes which apply to the Scheme area.

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## Part 2 - Reserves

### 13. Regional Reserves

There are no regional reserves in the Scheme area.

### 14. Local reserves

(1) In this clause –

**Department of Main Roads** means the department principally assisting in the administration of the *Main Roads Act 1930*;

**Western Australian Road Hierarchy** means the document of that name available on the website maintained by the Department of Main Roads.

(2) Local reserves are shown on the Scheme Map according to the legend on the Scheme Map.

(3) The objectives of each local reserve are as follows -

**18. Interpreting zoning table**

(1) The permissibility of uses of land in the various zones in the Scheme area is determined by cross-reference between the list of use classes on the left hand side of the zoning table and the list of zones at the top of the zoning table.

(2) The symbols used in the zoning table have the following meanings –

**P** means that the use is permitted if it complies with any relevant development standards and requirements of this Scheme;

**I** means that the use is permitted if it is consequent on, or naturally attaching, appertaining or relating to the predominant use of the land and it complies with any relevant development standards and requirements of this Scheme;

**D** means that the use is not permitted unless the local government has exercised its discretion by granting development approval;

**A** means that the use is not permitted unless the local government has exercised its discretion by granting development approval after giving notice in accordance with clause 64 of the deemed provisions;

**X** means that the use is not permitted by this Scheme.

*Note: 1. The development approval of the local government may be required to carry out works on land in addition to any approval granted for the use of land. In normal circumstances 1 application is made for both the carrying out of works on, and the use of, land.*

2. *Under clause 61 of the deemed provisions, certain works and uses are exempt from the requirement for development approval.*
  3. *Clause 67 of the deemed provisions deals with the consideration of applications for development approval by the local government. Under that clause, development approval cannot be granted for development that is a class X use in relation to the zone in which the development is located, except in certain circumstances where land is being used for a non-conforming use.*
- (3) A specific use class referred to in the zoning table is excluded from any other use class described in more general terms.
  - (4) The local government may, in respect of a use that is not specifically referred to in the zoning table and that cannot reasonably be determined as falling within a use class referred to in the zoning table –
    - (a) determine that the use is consistent with the objectives of a particular zone and is therefore a use that may be permitted in the zone subject to conditions imposed by the local government; or
    - (b) determine that the use may be consistent with the objectives of a particular zone and give notice under clause 64 of the deemed provisions before considering an application for development approval for the use of the land; or
    - (c) determine that the use is not consistent with the objectives of a particular zone and is therefore not permitted in the zone.
  - (5) If a use of land is identified in a zone as being a class P or class I use, the local government may not refuse an application for development approval for that use in that zone but may require works that are to be undertaken in connection with that use to have development approval.
  - (6) If the zoning table does not identify any permissible uses for land in a zone the local government may, in considering an application for development approval for land within the zone, have due regard to any of the following plans that apply to the land -
    - (a) a structure plan;
    - (b) a local development plan;
    - (c) a community layout plan.

**19. Additional uses**

There are no additional uses for zoned land that apply to this Scheme.

**20. Restricted uses**

- (1) Table 5 sets out –
  - (a) restricted classes of use for specified land that apply instead of the

classes of use that are permissible in the zone in which the land is located; and

(b) the conditions that apply to that restricted use.

(2) Despite anything contained in the zoning table, land that is specified in the Table to subclause (1) may be used only for the restricted class of use set out in respect of that land subject to the conditions that apply to that use.

**21. Special use zones**


- (1) Table 6 sets out -
  - (a) special use zones for specified land that are in addition to the zones in the zoning table; and
  - (b) the classes of special use that are permissible in that zone; and
  - (c) the conditions that apply in respect of the special uses.

- (2) A person must not use any land, or any structure or buildings on land, in a special use zone except for a class of use that is permissible in that zone and subject to the conditions that apply to that use.

*Note: Special use zones apply to special categories of land use which do not comfortably sit within any other zone in the Scheme.*



**22. Non-conforming uses**

- (1) Unless specifically provided, this Scheme does not prevent -
- (a) the continued use of any land, or any structure or building on land, for the purpose for which it was being lawfully used immediately before the commencement of this Scheme; or
  - (b) the carrying out of development on land if -
    - (i) before the commencement of this Scheme, the development was lawfully approved; and
    - (ii) the approval has not expired or been cancelled.
- (2) Subclause (1) does not apply if -
- (a) the non-conforming use of the land is discontinued; and
  - (b) a period of 6 months, or a longer period approved by the local government, has elapsed since the discontinuance of the non-conforming use.
- (3) Subclause (1) does not apply in respect of a non-conforming use of land if, under Part 11 of the Act, the local government -
- (a) purchases the land; or
  - (b) pays compensation to the owner of the land in relation to the non-conforming use.

**23. Changes to non-conforming use**

- (1) A person must not, without development approval-
- (a) alter or extend a non-conforming use of land; or
  - (b) erect, alter or extend a building used for, or in conjunction with, a non-conforming use; or
  - (c) repair, rebuild, alter or extend a building used for a non-conforming use that is destroyed to the extent of 75% or more of its value; or
  - (d) change the use of land from a non-conforming use to another use that is not permitted by the Scheme.
- (2) An application for development approval for the purposes of this clause must be advertised in accordance with clause 64 of the deemed provisions.
- (3) A local government may only grant development approval for a change of use of land referred to in subclause (1)(d) if, in the opinion of the local government, the proposed use -
- (a) is less detrimental to the amenity of the locality than the existing non-conforming use; and

- (b) is closer to the intended purpose of the zone in which the land is situated.

**24. Register of non-conforming uses**

- (1) The local government may prepare a register of land within the Scheme area that is being used for a non-conforming use.
- (2) A register prepared by the local government must set out the following -
  - (a) a description of each area of land that is being used for a non-conforming use;
  - (b) a description of any building on the land;
  - (c) a description of the non-conforming use;
  - (d) the date on which any discontinuance of the non-conforming use is noted.
- (3) If the local government prepares a register under subclause (1) the local government -
  - (a) must ensure that the register is kept up-to-date; and
  - (b) must ensure that an up-to-date copy of the register is published in accordance with clause 87 of the deemed provisions.
- (3A) Subclause (3)(b) is an ongoing publication requirement for the purposes of clause 87(5)(a) of the deemed provisions.
- (4) An entry in the register in relation to land that is being used for a non-conforming use is evidence of the matters set out in the entry, unless the contrary is proved.

## Part 4 - General development requirements

### 25. R-Codes

- (1) The R-Codes, modified as set out in clause 26, are to be read as part of this Scheme.
- (2) The local government must ensure that the R-Codes are published in accordance with clause 87 of the deemed provisions.
- (2A) Subclause (2) is an ongoing publication requirement for the purposes of clause 87(5)(a) of the deemed provisions.
- (3) The coding of land for the purposes of the R-Codes is shown by the coding number superimposed on a particular area contained within the boundaries of the area shown on the Scheme Map.
- (4) The R-Codes apply to an area if –
  - (a) the area has a coding number superimposed on it in accordance with subclause (3); or
  - (b) a provision of this Scheme provides that the R-Codes apply to the area.

### 26. Modification of R-Codes

- (1) ~~Clause 5.4.4 (External fixtures, utilities and facilities) of the R-codes is modified by replacing C4.5 with~~  
**C4.5** An enclosed, lockable storage area, constructed in a design and material matching the dwelling where visible from the street, accessible from outside the dwelling, with a minimum dimension of 1.5m when provided external to a garage and 1m when provided within a garage and an internal area of at least 4m<sup>2</sup>.

  - (b) have regard to any expressed views prior to making its determination to grant development approval under this clause.
- (5) The local government may only approve an application for development approval under this clause if the local government is satisfied that –
  - (a) approval of the proposed development would be appropriate having regard to the matters that the local government is to have regard to in considering an application for development approval as set out in clause 67(2) of the deemed provisions; and
  - (b) the non-compliance with the additional site and development requirement will not have a significant adverse effect on the occupiers or users of the development, the inhabitants of the locality or the likely future development of the locality.

**35. Restrictive covenants**

- (1) A restrictive covenant affecting land in the Scheme area that would have the effect of limiting the number of residential dwellings which may be constructed on the land is extinguished or varied to the extent that the number of residential dwellings that may be constructed is less than the number that could be constructed on the land under this Scheme.
- (2) If subclause (1) operates to extinguish or vary a restrictive covenant
  - (a) development approval is required to construct a residential dwelling that would result in the number of residential dwellings on the land

exceeding the number that would have been allowed under the restrictive covenant; and

- (b) the local government must not grant development approval for the construction of the residential dwelling unless it advertises the application for development approval in accordance with clause 64 of the deemed provisions.

## Part 6 - Terms referred to in Scheme

### Division 1 - General definitions used in Scheme

#### 37. Terms used

- (1) If a word or expression used in this Scheme is listed in this clause, its meaning is as follows -

<b>chalet</b>	means a dwelling forming part of a tourist development or caravan park that is - (a) a self-contained unit that includes cooking facilities, bathroom facilities and separate living and sleeping areas; and (b) designed to provide short-term accommodation for guests.
<b>commencement day</b>	means the day this Scheme comes into effect under section 87(4) of the Act.
<b>commercial vehicle</b>	means a vehicle, whether licenced or not, that has a gross vehicle mass of greater than 4.5 tonnes including - (a) a utility, van, truck, tractor, bus or earthmoving equipment; and (b) a vehicle that is, or is designed to be an attachment to a vehicle referred to in paragraph (a).
<b>floor area</b>	has meaning given in the Building Code.
<b>minerals</b>	has the meaning given in the <i>Mining Act 1978</i> section 8(1).
<b>plot ratio</b>	means the ratio of the floor area of a building to an area of land within the boundaries of the lot or lots on which the building is located.
<b>precinct</b>	means a definable area where particular planning policies, guidelines or standards apply.
<b>predominant use</b>	means the primary use of premises to which all other uses carried out on the premises are incidental.
<b>retail</b>	means the sale or hire of goods or services to the public.
<b>Scheme commencement day</b>	means the day this Scheme comes into effect under section 87(4) of the Act.

- short-term accommodation** means temporary accommodation provided either continuously or from time to time with no guest accommodated for periods totalling more than 3 months in any 12 month period.
- wholesale** means the sale of goods or materials to be sold by others.

- (2) A word or expression that is not defined in this Scheme –
- (a) has the meaning it has in the *Planning and Development Act 2005*; or
- (b) if it is not defined in that Act – has the same meaning as it has in the R-Codes.

### Division 2 - Land use terms used in Scheme

#### 38. Land use terms used

If this Scheme refers to a category of land use that is listed in this provision, the meaning of that land use is as follows -

- abattoir** means premises used commercially for the slaughtering of animals for the purposes of consumption as food products.
- aerodrome** means an area of land or water (including any buildings, installations and equipment) the use of which as an aerodrome is certified under the regulations made under the *Civil Aviation Act 1998*, being such an area intended for use wholly or partly for the arrival, departure or movement of aircraft.
- agriculture - extensive** means premises used for the raising of stock or crops including outbuildings and earthworks, but does not include agriculture - intensive or animal husbandry - intensive.
- agriculture - intensive** means premises used for commercial production purposes, including outbuildings and earthworks, associated with any of the following –
- (a) the production of grapes, vegetables, flowers, exotic or native plants, or fruit or nuts;
  - (b) the establishment and operation of plant or fruit nurseries;
  - (c) the development of land for irrigated fodder production or irrigated pasture (including turf farms);
  - (d) aquaculture.
- aircraft landing area** means an area used for the landing, taxing and take-off of aircraft.
- animal establishment** means premises used for the breeding, boarding, training or caring of animals for commercial purposes but does not include animal husbandry - intensive or veterinary centre.
- animal husbandry - intensive** means premises used for keeping, rearing or fattening of pigs, poultry (for either egg or meat production), rabbits (for either meat or fur production) or other livestock in feedlots, sheds or rotational pens.
- art gallery** means premises –
- (a) that are open to the public; and
  - (b) where artworks are displayed for viewing or sale.
- betting agency** means an office or totalisator agency established under the *Racing and Wagering Western Australia Act 2003*.

<b>corrective institution</b>	means premises used to hold and reform persons committed to it by a court, such as a prison or other type of detention facility.
<b>eco-tourist facility</b>	means a form of tourist development that is designed, constructed, operated and of a scale that is ecologically sustainable such that co-exists with and does not damage the natural resources and qualities that attracts tourists to the location.
<b>educational establishment</b>	means premises used for the purposes of providing education including premises used for a school, higher education institution, business college, academy or other educational institution.
<b>exhibition centre</b>	means premises used for the display, or display and sale, of materials of an artistic, cultural or historical nature including a museum.
<b>family day care</b>	means premises where a family day care service as defined in the <i>Education and Care Services National Law (Western Australia)</i> is provided.
<b>food outlet</b>	means premises, including premises with a facility for drive-through service, used for the preparation, sale and serving of food to customers in a form ready to be eaten – (a) without further preparation; and (b) primarily off the premises.
<b>fuel depot</b>	means premises used for the storage and sale in bulk of solid or liquid or gaseous fuel but does not include premises used – (a) as a service station; or (b) for the sale of fuel by retail into a vehicle for use by the vehicle.
<b>funeral parlour</b>	means premises used – (a) to prepare and store bodies for burial or cremation; (b) to conduct funeral services.
<b>garden centre</b>	means premises used for the propagation, rearing and sale of plants, and the storage and sale of products associated with horticulture and gardens.
<b>holiday accommodation</b>	means 2 or more dwellings on one lot used to provide short term accommodation for persons other than the owner of the lot.
<b>holiday house</b>	means a single dwelling on one lot used to provide short-term accommodation but does not include a bed and breakfast.

<b>home business</b>	<p>means a dwelling or land around a dwelling used by an occupier of the dwelling to carry out a business, service or profession if the carrying out of the business, service or profession -</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(a) does not involve employing more than 2 people who are not members of the occupier's household; and</li> <li>(b) will not cause injury to or adversely affect the amenity of the neighbourhood; and</li> <li>(c) does not occupy an area greater than 50 m<sup>2</sup>; and</li> <li>(d) does not involve the retail sale, display or hire of any goods unless the sale, display or hire is done only by means of the Internet; and</li> <li>(e) does not result in traffic difficulties as a result of the inadequacy of parking or an increase in traffic volumes in the neighbourhood; and</li> <li>(f) does not involve the presence, use or calling of a vehicle more than 4.5 tonnes tare weight; and</li> <li>(g) does not involve the use of an essential service that is greater than the use normally required in the zone in which the dwelling is located.</li> </ul>

<b>home store</b>	<p>means a shop attached to a dwelling that -</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(a) has a net lettable area not exceeding 100 m<sup>2</sup>; and</li> <li>(b) is operated by a person residing in the dwelling.</li> </ul>
<b>hospital</b>	<p>means premises used as a hospital as defined in the <i>Hospitals and Health Services Act 1927</i> section 2(1).</p>
<b>hotel</b>	<p>means premises the subject of a hotel licence other than a small bar or tavern licence granted under the <i>Liquor Control Act 1988</i> including any betting agency on the premises.</p>

<b>Industry</b>	means premises used for the manufacture, dismantling, processing, assembly, treating, testing, servicing, maintenance or repairing of goods, products, articles, materials or substances and includes facilities on the premises for any of the following purposes – (a) the storage of goods; (b) the work of administration or accounting; (c) the selling of goods by wholesale or retail; (d) the provision of amenities for employees; (e) incidental purposes.
<b>industry - extractive</b>	means premises, other than premises used for mining operations, that are used for the extraction of basic raw materials including by means of ripping, blasting or dredging and may include facilities for any of the following purposes – (a) the processing of raw materials including crushing, screening, washing, blending or grading; (b) activities associated with the extraction of basic raw materials including wastewater treatment, storage, rehabilitation, loading, transportation, maintenance and administration.
<b>industry - light</b>	means premises used for an industry where impacts on the amenity of the area in which the premises is located can be mitigated, avoided or managed.

<b>marina</b>	means – (a) premises used for providing mooring, fuelling, servicing, repairing, storage and other facilities for boats, including the associated sale of any boating gear or equipment; and (b) all jetties, piers, embankments, quays, moorings, offices and storerooms used in connection with the provision of those services.
<b>marina filling station</b>	means premises used for the storage and supply of liquid fuels and lubricants for marine craft.
<b>market</b>	means premises used for the display and sale of goods from stalls by independent vendors.
<b>medical centre</b>	means premises other than a hospital used by 3 or more health practitioners at the same time for the investigation or treatment of human injuries or ailments and for general outpatient care.
<b>mining operations</b>	means premises where mining operations, as that term is defined in the <i>Mining Act 1978</i> section 8(1), is carried out.

<b>motel</b>	means premises, which may be licensed under the <i>Liquor Control Act 1988</i> - (a) used to accommodate guests in a manner similar to a hotel; and (b) with specific provision for the accommodation of guests with motor vehicles.
<b>motor vehicle, boat or caravan sales</b>	means premises used to sell or hire motor vehicles, boats or caravans.
<b>motor vehicle repair</b>	means premises used for or in connection with - (a) electrical and mechanical repairs, or overhauls, to vehicles other than panel beating, spray painting or chassis reshaping of vehicles; or (b) repairs to tyres other than recapping or retreading of tyres.
<b>motor vehicle wash</b>	means premises primarily used to wash motor vehicles.
<b>nightclub</b>	means premises the subject of a nightclub licence granted under the <i>Liquor Control Act 1988</i> .
<b>office</b>	means premises used for administration, clerical, technical, professional or similar business activities.
<b>place of worship</b>	means premises used for religious activities such as a chapel, church, mosque, synagogue or temple.
<b>reception centre</b>	means premises used for hosted functions on formal or ceremonial occasions.
<b>recreation - private</b>	means premises that are - (a) used for indoor or outdoor leisure, recreation or sport; and (b) not usually open to the public without charge.
<b>renewable energy facility</b>	renewable energy facility means premises used to generate energy from a renewable energy source and includes any building or other structure used in, or in conjunction with, the generation of energy by a renewable resource, where energy is being produced for commercial gain (i.e. solar farms as opposed to solar panels).
<b>residential aged care facility</b>	means a residential facility providing personal and/or nursing care primarily to people who are frail and aged and which, as well as accommodation, includes appropriate staffing to meet the nursing and personal care needs of residents; meals and cleaning services; furnishings, furniture and equipment. May also include residential respite (short term) care but does not include a hospital or psychiatric facility.
<b>residential building</b>	as per the definition within Appendix 1 of the Volume 1 of the R-Codes.
<b>resource recovery centre</b>	means premises other than a waste disposal facility used for the recovery of resources from waste.
<b>restaurant/cafe</b>	means premises primarily used for the preparation, sale and serving of food and drinks for consumption on the premises by customers for whom seating is provided, including premises that are licenced under the <i>Liquor Control Act 1988</i> .
<b>restricted premises</b>	means premises used for the sale by retail or wholesale, or the offer for hire, loan or exchange, or the exhibition, display or delivery of - (a) publications that are classified as restricted under the <i>Classification (Publications, Films and Computer Games) Act 1995</i> (Commonwealth); and (b) materials, compounds, preparations or articles which are used or intended to be used primarily in or in connection with any form of sexual behaviour or activity; or (c) smoking-related implements.

<b>road house</b>	<p>means premises that has direct access to a State road other than a freeway and which provides the services or facilities provided by a freeway service centre and may provide any of the following facilities or services –</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(a) a full range of automotive repair services;</li> <li>(b) wrecking, panel beating and spray painting services;</li> <li>(c) transport depot facilities;</li> <li>(d) short-term accommodation for guests;</li> <li>(e) facilities for being a muster point in response to accidents, natural disasters and other emergencies.</li> </ul>
<b>rural home business</b>	<p>means a dwelling or land around a dwelling used by an occupier of the dwelling to carry out a business, service or profession if the carrying out of the business, service or occupation –</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(a) does not involve employing more than 2 people who are not members of the occupier's household; and</li> <li>(b) will not cause injury to or adversely affect the amenity of the neighbourhood; and</li> <li>(c) does not occupy an area greater than 200 m<sup>2</sup>; and</li> <li>(d) does not result in traffic difficulties as a result of the inadequacy of parking or an increase in traffic volumes in the neighbourhood; and</li> <li>(e) does not involve the presence, use or calling of more than 3 vehicles at any one time or of a vehicle more than 30 tonnes gross weight.</li> </ul>
<b>rural pursuit/hobby farm</b>	<p>means any premises, other than premises used for agriculture - extensive or agriculture - intensive, that are used by an occupier of the premises to carry out any of the following activities if carrying out of the activity does not involve permanently employing a person who is not a member of the occupier's household –</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(a) the rearing, agistment, stabling or training of animals;</li> <li>(b) the keeping of bees;</li> <li>(c) the sale of produce grown solely on the premises.</li> </ul>
<b>serviced apartment</b>	<p>means a group of units or apartments providing –</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(a) self-contained short-stay accommodation for guests; and</li> <li>(b) any associated reception or recreational facilities.</li> </ul>
<b>service station</b>	<p>means premises other than premises used for a transport depot, panel beating, spray painting, major repairs or wrecking, that are used for –</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>(a) the retail sale of petroleum products, motor vehicle accessories and goods of an incidental or convenience nature; or</li> <li>(b) the carrying out of greasing, tyre repairs and minor mechanical repairs to motor vehicles.</li> </ul>
<b>shop</b>	<p>means premises other than a bulky goods showroom, a liquor store large or a liquor store - small used to sell goods by retail, to hire goods, or to provide services of a personal nature, including hairdressing or beauty therapy services.</p>
<b>small bar</b>	<p>means premises the subject of a small bar licence granted under the <i>Liquor Control Act 1988</i>.</p>
<b>tavern</b>	<p>means premises the subject of a tavern licence granted under the <i>Liquor Control Act 1988</i>.</p>
<b>telecommunications infrastructure</b>	<p>means premises used to accommodate the infrastructure used by or in connection with a telecommunications network including any line, equipment, apparatus, tower, antenna, tunnel, duct, hole, pit or other structure related to the network.</p>

<b>tourist development</b>	means a building, or a group of buildings forming a complex, other than a bed and breakfast, a caravan park or holiday accommodation, used to provide - (a) short-term accommodation for guests; and (b) onsite facilities for the use of guests; and (c) facilities for the management of the development;
<b>trade display</b>	means premises used for the display of trade goods and equipment for the purpose of advertisement.
<b>trade supplies</b>	means premises used to sell by wholesale or retail, or to hire, assemble or manufacture any materials, tools, equipment, machinery or other goods used for any of the following purposes including goods which may be assembled or manufactured off the premises - (a) automotive repairs and servicing; (b) building including repair and maintenance; (c) industry; (d) landscape gardening; (e) provision of medical services; (f) primary production; (g) use by government departments or agencies, including local government.
<b>transport depot</b>	means premises used primarily for the parking or garaging of 3 or more commercial vehicles including - (a) any ancillary maintenance or refueling of those vehicles; and (b) any ancillary storage of goods brought to the premises by those vehicles; and (c) the transfer of goods or persons from one vehicle to another.
<b>tree farm</b>	means land used commercially for tree production where trees are planted in blocks of more than one hectare, including land in respect of which a carbon right is registered under the <i>Carbon Rights Act 2003</i> section 5.
<b>veterinary centre</b>	means premises used to diagnose animal diseases or disorders, to surgically or medically treat animals, or for the prevention of animal diseases or disorders.
<b>warehouse/storage</b>	means premises including indoor or outdoor facilities used for (a) the storage of goods, equipment, plant or materials; or (b) the display or the sale by wholesale of goods.
<b>waste disposal facility</b>	means premises used - (a) for the disposal of waste by landfill; or (b) the incineration of hazardous, clinical or biomedical waste.
<b>waste storage facility</b>	means premises used to collect, consolidate, temporarily store or sort waste before transfer to a waste disposal facility or a resource recovery facility on a commercial scale.
<b>winery</b>	means premises used for the production of viticultural produce and associated sale of the produce.
<b>workforce accommodation</b>	means premises, which may include modular or relocatable buildings, used - (a) primarily for the accommodation of workers engaged in construction, resource, agricultural or other industries on a temporary basis; and (b) for any associated catering, sporting and recreation facilities for the occupants and authorised visitors.

## Schedule A - Supplemental provisions to the deemed provisions

These provisions are to be read in conjunction with the deemed provisions (Schedule 2) contained in the *Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015*.

### 60. Requirement for Development Approval

*Note:*

3. *Mining operations, as defined in s.8 of the Mining Act 1978, including anything incidental or conducive to mining operations, and any activity authorised under a State Agreement, does not require development approval of the local government under the Planning and Development Act 2005. However, Pursuant to s.120 of the Mining Act 1978, in considering any application for the grant of a mining tenement, the Minister, warden or mining registrar, shall consider the provisions of any planning scheme in force under the Planning and Development Act 2005, but those provisions cannot operate to prohibit or affect the granting of a mining tenement, or the carrying out of any mining operation authorised by the Mining Act 1978.*

*Accordingly, upon receipt of:*

- a) a Form 21 Mining Tenement Application referral, including those made pursuant to s.33(1)(a) or s.91(9) of the Mining Act 1978;*
- b) a referral by the Minister for Mines and Petroleum made pursuant to s.24(5B) or s.24(3B) of the Mining Act 1978 or from the Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety more generally;*
- c) any proposal to create or amend a State Agreement made under the Government Agreements Act 1978;*
- d) a clearing permit, works, licence or licence renewal application made pursuant to the Environmental Protection Act 1986 –*

*the local government may consider the proposal and lodge a submission concerning the application with the Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety (in the case of a mining tenement or applicable clearing permit application), the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation (in the case of a works, licence/renewal or clearing permit application) or the Department of Jobs, Tourism, Science and Innovation (in the case of a state agreement matter), lodge an objection to the application with the warden (in the case of an applicable mining tenement application) or write to the Minister for Mines and Petroleum and Minister for Planning advising that mining operation are contrary to the provisions of the scheme (in the case of a mining lease or a general purpose lease application).*

### 85A. Transitional Provisions for Planning Instruments established under the Shire of Ashburton Local Planning Scheme No. 7

Any planning instrument, as defined pursuant to r. 77 of the Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015, prepared and adopted in accordance with the requirements of Local Planning Scheme No. 7, shall continue to have effect, and may be amended or revoked, as if it were a planning instrument prepared and adopted under Local Planning Scheme No. 8.




Overall Scheme


Onslow Townsite






